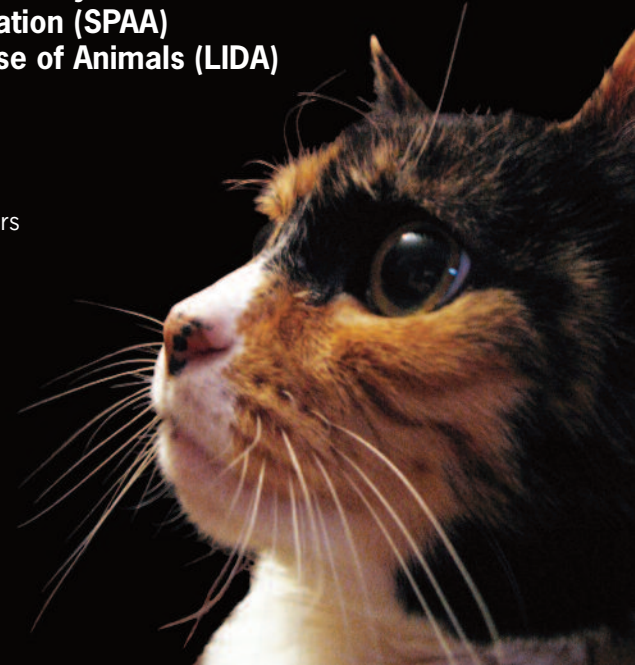

Online certificate courses consist of a blend of case studies, applicable laws, and engaging instruction about the role of animals in the community. Courses include rights, conflicts, public policy, safety, control, and litigation. Periodic conference calls enhance your connection to the instructors and other students. To earn your online Certificate in Animals, Community, and Law, complete the following overview courses and a practicum or project applying selected course content in real issues or organized initiatives.

Animals in Disasters, Estates, and Litigation (*January to April of each year*) explores the individual/state dynamics addressing animal needs in death and disasters.

Animal Cruelty and the Law (*May to July of each year*) explores the many facets of cruelty to animals in legislation and litigation.

Companion Animals and the Law (*September to November of each year*) examines trap, neuter, and return, municipal ordinances, limit laws, hoarding, and more.

Practicum provides guided hands-on experience in animal-related issues. This course runs concurrently with each of the other courses. The Practicum may be taken after one or more content course. Practicum sites must be approved by the instructors.
